
Living Faith @

Family Lent Ideas

Lent Idea #1 Choose a charity to support and have everyone in the family save change for a week or longer!

Lent Idea #2 Print off a world map, choose a country and pray for it. Draw a smiley face on the map to show where you have prayed for.

Lent Idea #3 Make a card and send it to one of your friends and relatives. Before you send it, thank God for that person.

Lent Idea #4 Count your blessings every day with the Blessing Jar.

**Take a jam or coffee jar and decorate it. Cut up some bits of paper and put them by the jar with some pens or pencils. Put the jar somewhere accessible to everybody at any time e.g kitchen table. When something good happens or someone has been kind to you, write it on a slip of paper and put it in the jar. Make a routine of opening the jar once a day or once a week when everyone is together, reading the slips and saying thank you to God for His blessings! Maybe you could even glue them all into a book to look back at in the future to see how God has blessed you!

Lent Idea #5 Use the Freedom Bubbles prayer.

**Talk about Jesus dying to set us free from the wrong things we had done and also to release us from the things that worry us. Then thing about something you wished you hadn't done or something you were worried about and, in your heads or out loud, asked God to help you with it or to forgive you. Then blow some bubbles and watched them float as a symbol of the freedom that Jesus was giving you.

Jelly Bean Prayer

Supplies:

- Assorted colors of Jelly Beans (M&M's or Skittles may also be used, adapt colors as needed)

Green-For all of God's creation **Red-**For all those who protect and care for us.

Orange-For all those that teach us **Yellow-**For all families and the members of your family

Purple-For our the leaders of government, the church, and our communities

Black-For the things that are most important to your family.

White-For what you are thankful for.





Seven Days to Easter

Starting on Palm Sunday, follow Jesus' footsteps. Choose a time when the family can be together and read the Bible story and discuss the story. You can also do fun things with the key objects such as: hide the objects and find them, create, draw or color the objects, or place them at your dinner table for discussion.

Day 1– Palm Sunday Story: Jesus entering Jerusalem Scripture: John 12:12-19, Mark 11:1-11 Key objects: palm branch, donkey

Day 2– Monday Story: Jesus turning over money changer's tables Scripture: Mark 11:15-19, Matthew 21:12-17 Key object: coins

Day 3– Tuesday Story: The withered fig tree Scripture: Mark 11:12-14, 11:20-25, Matthew 21:18-22 Key objects: fig tree, figs

Day 4– Wednesday Story: Woman anointing Jesus; Judas agreeing to betray Scripture: Mark 14:1-11; Matthew 26:6-13, 26:14-16

Key Objects: perfume (pour some on cloth), 30 silver coins

Day 5- Thursday Story: The Last Supper, foot washing, Garden of Gethsemane Scripture: Mark 14:17-26, 32-42; John 12: 1-17

Key objects: bread, wine, bowl with water

Day 6– Friday Story: The crucifixion; the burial Scripture: Luke 23; Matthew 17:1-61

Key objects: cross, crown of thorns, dice, sponge, nails

Day 7– Saturday Story: The tomb; prophecy of Crucifixion

Scripture: Matthew 17:62-66; Isaiah 53

Key objects: stone, lamb, tomb
